## LITTLETON MUSEUM LIVING HISTORY FARMS

### JANUARY

In Colorado January can have pleasant, brisk days as well as bitterly cold snows. When you live on a farm you must be prepared for whatever nature sends your way! During the cold winter months, you will often find the historic interpreters indoors during the day, working by a fire or stove. But they are also outside making sure the livestock is safe and comfortable in all kinds of weather.

*"The house was heated by a coal stove. They had what they called the old potbelly stoves. I can remember there in the old log house at the ranch, they had it sitting in a corner, and behind it was a bench. We'd come in with our feet cold and...we'd pull everything off...We'd sit there and rest our feet on the bottom ring around the bottom of the stove to warm up our toes. – and usually we'd wind up burning them. But all we ever had was just the coal heat, both for the kitchen, to cook on, and for the heat."*
